The primary service area includes: Alton, Brookfield, Effingham, Freedom, Ossipee, Tamworth, Tuftonboro, Wakefield and Wolfeboro. Secondary service areas are parts of Barnstead, Gilford, Moultonborough and New Durham. These towns are located in Carroll County, Belknap County and Strafford County.

Huggins Hospital serves the general population. The community is rural in nature and has a seasonal population increase from approximately 40,000 full-time residents to about 120,000 residents in the summer tourist season. The area has also seen continuous growth in the senior population throughout the years and that demographic is projected to continue growing.

Huggins Hospital also presented the data and analysis to the community during the hospital's Community Health Summit. The event provided an opportunity for community members and local health and safety agencies to determine significant health needs and goals for improvement. Over sixty individuals from over forty community and healthcare organizations collaborated to conduct a comprehensive CHNA process focused on identifying and defining significant health needs, issues, and concerns of the community. The process centered on gathering and analyzing data as well as receiving input from persons who represented the broad interests of the community and who had special knowledge and expertise in public health. The participants helped provide direction for the Hospital to create a plan to improve the health of the community.
