What exactly is Open Bore MRI?

While MRI (magnetic resonance imaging) has been around for some time and has delivered remarkable advances to medicine, the technology has not been without its challenges. Generating crisp 3-D images of the body without radiation has helped clinicians to better and more safely detect and diagnose all sorts of diseases. Yet to provide highly detailed images, the opening on most MRI systems had to be narrow, which presented problems for both larger patients and those suffering from claustrophobia or anxiety. This eliminated a considerable number of people as MRI candidates.

Open MRI technology followed, providing more room for those being scanned, but the larger spaces reduced the image quality physicians needed. Recent advancements have erased the need for compromise.

Huggins' new Open Bore MRI brings improved diagnostic capabilities and patient comfort together in one remarkable

system. Thanks to its magnetic strength (capable of scanning many types of implants and stents by adjusting the imaging protocols, something previous MRI units could not do), the Open Bore MRI delivers faster scan times and significantly enhanced image quality, which allows our clinicians to diagnose more quickly and with increased **confidence**. It also allows more people to have MRI imaging who may not have been a candidate in the past.

Patient **comfort** is enhanced significantly as well. Open Bore MRI allows as much as 12 inches of headroom to accommodate larger patients and provides a more relaxed environment for those who are claustrophobic or uncomfortable in tight spaces.

Huggins Hospital offers *Telestroke* and *Teleneurology Services* through GraniteOne Health Affiliation

very minute counts during a stroke. In a rural community, minutes multiply quickly with the time it takes to travel long distances. In an initiative with fellow GraniteOne Health members, Huggins Hospital now offers life-saving telestroke services in the Emergency Department. This new service builds upon the strength of the hospital's existing stroke program to bring even more specialized care directly to our communities.

Telestroke is a telehealth service that allows remote consults with neurologists. This service provides patients with specialized, time-sensitive stroke treatments faster, greatly affecting positive outcomes.

During a stroke, blood-thinning drugs and surgery can prevent traumatic brain injury, but doctors and emergency personnel must act fast. A life-saving procedure called a clot retrieval, for instance, is only effective within about eight hours of a stroke's onset. A drug called tPA, which dissolves stroke-inducing blood clots, must start acting within about four hours.

Huggins Hospital offers Telestroke and Teleneurology Services through GraniteOne Health Affiliation (continued from cover)

Prior to telestroke services, Huggins Hospital Emergency Department physicians had to call other healthcare facilities to find an available neurologist if a consultation was needed. With telestroke services provided by a group called TeleSpecialists, a neurologist can be on the telehealth screen and waiting, even before a patient arrives via ambulance.

"This service will improve access to stroke specialists in our community," said Huggins Hospital's Chief Medical Officer John Boornazian, MD. "Adding a consultation with a neurologist—even through a computer screen creates a more advanced and timely system of care."

The GraniteOne Health telehealth initiative also includes teleneurology, a service that currently provides access to a neurologist for the care of Huggins Hospital inpatients and emergency patients. Telehealth programs, such as telestroke and teleneurology, help fill the care gap in rural communities by supporting hospital staff through audio and video technology. The services are not intended to replace hands-on care, but to provide an additional

communication tool for medical staff via real-time technology.

Telehealth is one of the partnership initiatives of GraniteOne Health. Catholic Medical Center, Huggins Hospital and Monadnock Community Hospital are working together to improve access to high-quality care and a seamless patient experience for Granite Staters.

ccording to the Brain Injury Research Institute, concussions are one of the most common human injuries, with an estimated 1.6 to 3.8 million occurring in the United States alone each year.

On Oct. 25 at 6 PM, Pediatric Nurse Practitioner Deb Stone, MS, APRN, PNP-C, PMHCS, will give a presentation about concussions and how to properly treat them.

Stone will talk about what happens in the brain during a concussion, the symptoms, and when it is okay to return to normal physical activity. There will also be a Q & A session at the end of the presentation.

The stretcher, designed to reduce physical strain on caregivers and enhance the comfort of the patient, saves time during treatment. The stretcher comes with special features such as a built-in weight scale—a critical tool for the treatment of stroke patients when every second counts (read more in the Telehealth story on page 1).

"As we move forward in our GraniteOne Health affiliation and bring more services such as telestroke to our community, it is imperative we have the support systems in place," said Monika O'Clair, Huggins Hospital's Vice President of Strategy & Community Relations.
